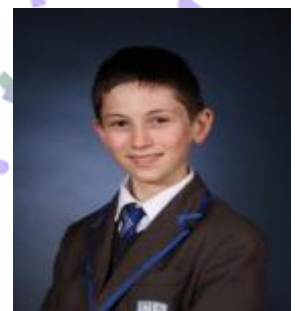
'Lockdown Leavers 2020'

LITTLE PEARS

Who are we?

We are an after school club for children from Carnforth school. Little Pears club is for busy families who need a safe place for their children to be cared for while they work, attend appointments etc.



What will your child do at the club?

Club users will have plenty of activities and games to keep them amused, thus improving their social skills and encouraging them to make new friends. The club is very relaxed and the children are able to choose how they would like to spend their time with a variety of activities. Two snacks are provided during the session.

Registration

We require a completed set of registration forms for your child before they can attend the club. Regular users can apply to see if they qualify for our invoicing service.

How much is it?

The current fees are £3.50 from 3.00 pm to 4.30 pm & 3.00 pm– 6.00 pm £7.00. Fees are payable in advance by cash or cheque, which should be made payable to Carnforth School. Prices include food and a drink. Parents/guardians to collect at the end of the session.

How do I book?

You can come to or telephone the school office and book which sessions you would like your child to attend each week or each half term.

What about short notice?

There will be a few places every day for 'short notice' bookings, for example when parents are stuck in traffic, working late or have an appointment. Just let the office know before 3pm.

BREAKFAST CLUB

Our breakfast club is available every school day from 8:00am until the start of the school day.

The children can have some breakfast to set them up for their mornings learning, play games, colour, or just sit and chat with their friends.

The cost is £1.00 from 8:00am to 8:50am, or if you prefer to bring your child in at 8:30am, it will be 50p.

FREE SCHOOL MEALS OVER THE SUMMER HOLIDAY

The DfE has published guidance on the [COVID Summer Food Fund](#), a scheme that will give families access to FSM vouchers over the Summer holidays.

Schools can order the vouchers via Edenred's online portal, and must do so at least one week before their school term ends – the vouchers will then be issued to families within seven days. This means we will not be able to register families which become eligible after **Friday 10th July 2020**.

ONWARDS AND UPWARDS

September: At present, we are working on the assumption that we will be welcoming all children back to school on a fulltime basis. In March, when the school partially closed we made it clear that no parent would be penalised for choosing not to send their child back to school. Now the circumstances have changed the DfE have stated that 'it is vital for all children to return to school'.

From September it will be **mandatory** for all children to return to school. This **does not apply** to children who are shielding due to advice from the professional health specialist they are under or they are complying with clinical / public health advice. The usual rules including fines will be reinstated from September.

We are also hoping to offer our wrap around care service for all children from 8:00am to 6:00pm. We will need to respond flexibly to this as we receive more guidance. We will update you with how these services will be run over the next few weeks.

At present we are expecting children to return in **full school uniform** under advice from the DfE.

It is my current understanding that we will still be operating under some restrictions and preventative measures, which will mean some changes to the running of the school. When the government release its guidance, we will alter our plans accordingly and I will write to you to confirm arrangements. It is my current understanding that we will be minimising contact between groups of children. I would like to offer my gratitude once again for your continued support and understanding as we react to the changes, altering the plans we have in place.
