#### MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD TEACHER

It's been quite a busy week at Carnforth!

#### **Governor Visit:**

We've had visits from our Governors and had the chance to share what we have been working on as a school. It was great to celebrate and have them in school.

#### Chicks:

We're excited to be receiving some chicks in Nursery next week! This links in with Nursery's topic, but we are looking forward to be following their journey as a whole school. #### Lates:

239 separate incidents of arriving late before registers close since returning to school in January. This has a significant impact on learning. The school day begins at 8.45am. If children arrive late, they miss out on learning time that is used to set up their day.

#### NURSERY

Wow! What an exciting few weeks we have had in Nursery. We have been busy, busy! Our current topic is 'Down at the Farm', and we have been learning all about what happens on a farm. We've looked at the role of a farmer, the different animals and their babies, the food we get from farms, tractors, how the farmer plants their crops and so much more. We have been up to lots in the classroom, we've made chicks, explored our farm tuff tray, made porridge using oats from the farm, planted cress, tomatoes and marigolds. We've also been working hard on our cutting skills and have enjoyed farm based fine motor activities.

As our 'Down at the Farm' topic comes to an end, I would like to thank the children in Nursery for their hard work over the past 2 weeks. They have shown dedication and enthusiasm towards their learning – their grown-ups should be proud, I certainly am. Nursery are looking forward to starting our new topic, 'Signs of Spring', where we will be welcoming some fluffy yellow friends into Nursery. This will give the children in both Nursery and the rest of the school the opportunity to gain vital life skills whilst learning how to care for and respect these precious animals.

Nursery also participated in World Book Day 2025. We had a wonderful day admiring each other's costumes, participating in the school parade and finishing the day with our parent DEAR time.







#### RECEPTION

Reception really enjoyed world book day. We had fun seeing all of our friends costumes and learning about our author Julia Donaldson. We loved the Gruffalo and even made some yummy Gruffalo cakes.





For our science topic, we have been learning about rubbish, recycling and composting. Reception looked at the artist Robert Bradford who recycles old toys to make sculptures. We used our own recycled materials and used plastic bottles to make fish. We used our collage skills to make our fish colourful!



In Talk For Writing reception have been learning the story of Little Rabbit Foo Foo. Reception have found it very funny and have enjoyed retelling the story, as well as using their cutting skills to make their own Rabbit Foo Foo.

We have all become polar explorers in Year 1 this half term! The children have loved learning about Captain Scott, why he is a significant figure and why we remember him. As historians, we have looked at photographs and other clues to work out what it would have been like to be a polar explorer in the early 1900s. Our main takeaway was that it would be VERY cold!









The children are excited to be researching what a modern Antarctic vehicle might need to transport scientists across the polar region. They will be designing and making their own vehicle, with wheels and axels, very soon.

As writers, the children have learnt a diary entry from Sophie Scott Goes South', our focus story this half term, about an Antarctic explorer. They have written their own diary entries about exploring their own destination, describing their feelings and what they have seen. We have diaries from explorers who have visited Africa, the Ukraine and even Minecraft world!



In maths, we have been learning how to make 20, using our number bonds to 10 to help. For example, if I know 3 + 7 = 10, I know 13 + 7 = 20. You could practise this at home with your children too! In Science, we have been learning about properties of materials, how they are useful for certain jobs, and what happens to water when it gets very cold! We even had Daisy the toy cow volunteer for an overnight trip to the freezer to demonstrate...!







Finally, all the children are making amazing progress in their reading and phonics. Thank you for all of those of you who have written in the reading diaries – reading at home is one of the most important and helpful ways to support your child's learning.

This week, Year 2 have been learning about Mary Seacole's life and how she helped soldiers in the Crimean war. They created a timeline about her life and used the pictures as sources to help them find out more about what life was like back then.





As artists they have been exploring collage and have chosen pictures of Jamaica to do this with. They have chosen sections of their picture to recreate in collage and discussed the shapes, materials, colours and lines in their collage.

In Science they have had lots of fun doing experiments with torches and materials to see which are transparent, translucent and opaque. They found that wood was opaque, plastic was translucent, and glass was translucent and transparent.



Year 3 are very excited to be creating a prototype fish capturer for our DT unit. We have been asked by Unlocking the Severn to help capture the fry (fish that have just been hatched) of the shad fish. This means they can be tracked so we can see their journey. Sadly, shad have dropped massively in numbers in Worcester since the weir has been in place. Now a fish pass has been created, shad are able to make their journey to shallow rivers to spawn. We have been designing capturers which need to follow a specific design criterion, for example, they need to be waterproof. In order for our capturers to extend, we have been making linkages. A linkage is multiple levers fixed together. This took a lot of patience and resilience, but Year 3 made some very impressive creations!








We have had a great couple of weeks back working hard.

As readers, we have been exploring our new book, The Wild Robot. We have been loving this book and a lot of us have seen the film version. We have enjoyed looking at the similarities and differences between the book and the film. We have been exploring lots of new vocabulary – ask us what we have learnt!







This week is Science Week! We took part in a BBC live lesson all about being in space with the British astronaut Tim Peak. We enjoyed filling in the activities alongside learning all about life in space.

We also completed an experiment where we had to sort coins with a magnet to see if they are magnetic or not. We learnt that coins made before 1992 were not magnetic and coins made after 1992 were magnetic because of the material that they are made of.

We are now over halfway through the school year!
Well done for all your amazing progress so far.

We have a fantastic half term filled with amazing opportunities; we have already had world book day and exciting visitors from STEM and Rock Steady.





## THE IMPORTANCE OF PUNCTUALITY

# Punctuality matters! Being frequently late for school adds up to lost learning:

 Arriving 5 minutes late every day adds up to over 3 days lost each year.

- Arriving 15 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 2 weeks a year.
- Arriving 30 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 19 days a year.

19 days lost a year through being late means 90% attendance.
